New Business

- 2. Challenge: after much discussion, the challenge was determined to be:
 - PICK 4 COLORS of fiber and show how they can interact.
- 3. MAFA grant: too late to apply for this year. Limited to programs that spread the word about fiber arts beyond the guild. For example, we could offer an introductory weaving class, and a grant could pay for space to offer such a class. Kathy will explore various options for space, and Micki will review the MAFA website.
- 4. Next steps in weaving discussion of possible study group. Some interest in doing this in August, but we need a date.

5. Facebook account: Jessica could set one up for those interested. Some members indicated they would not use a Facebook so the Website and email notifications would have to continue

Old Business

- Teaching a "Makers" class. We will teach cardboard weaving on May 5th at the Stryker Center (next to the Wiliamsburg Public Library). Members are requested to bring some worsted wool to the April meeting when we will prepare the materials for the class.

Sandi showed some antique rug punch hooks, gave away some frame looms, and showed her challenge, a plarn trash can "cozy."

Cindy showed her favorite needlework tools, and challenge: a pair of plarn bags, including one made from a videotape version of "Tootsie." Her favorite tool was a sharpie, which she uses to mark distances on the reed of her rigid heddle loom.

Marsha showed Plarn bags, woven jewelry and small loom tapestries.

Micki Pugh had needlework in progress.

Barbara displayed one piece joined knitting needles, and spindle spun yarn stored on one of her favorite tools, the orphan straight knitting needle.

Goodie showed off her box woven plarn bag.

Claudia had made a plarn cat mat, and brought her favorite tool, a pair of scissors with a bend the raise the handle.

Ingrid had cranked out gloves on her antique sock machine, and showed 2 plarn bags. Her favorite tools included a plastic wrist band, which she uses to mark her treadles; fishing weights; short lengths of Tshirt yarn for choke ties, and a tiny metal square.





If you have a Good Wood loom, frame loom or cardboard loom bring it along. We'll look at how to use a Magic Heddle in tapestry weaving, as well as basic tapestry techniques on a frame or cardboard loom. Available will be handouts on warping a frame loom and tapestry techniques.

In addition to your loom also bring scissors, tapestry needle, fork and some yarn - bulky and others for blending and sharing. This would be an excellent way to use up bits of hand spun or special yarns.

Goodie's SUPER BASH FRUIT SALAD

- 1 (20 oz) can chunk or tidbit pineapple
- 1 (29 oz) can sliced peaches (or 2 smaller cans)
- 4 small tart apples, cored and cut into pieces
- 3 cups seedless grapes
- 3 cups sliced strawberries
- 2 medium bananas
- 1 (3 oz) box vanilla pudding (do not use instant)

Drain pineapple. Mix drained juice with vanilla pudding powder in a sauce pan. Stir the mixture while heating to the start of a boil. Cool. Mix drained canned and fresh fruits (except bananas) with cooled pudding mixture*. Slice bananas and mix with a little lemon juice to deter discoloring and add before serving. Make fruit salad one day ahead for best flavor.

Yields approximately 10 cups. You can change out fresh fruit depending on what is available but pudding mixture should stay the same.

* If you wish to thin cooked pudding mixture use a little of the juice from the other drained canned fruit but the mixture will thin out some with the addition of the other canned fruits.
