#### **Committee Reports:**

Membership: (Sandi) At the beginning of the meeting we had 40 members.

Newsletter (Marsha): Nothing new to report. Membership spontaneously offered kudos to Marsha for producing the newsletter and to Barb for the editing,

OCTOBER program: Speakers from Colonial Williamsburg.

NOVEMBER program: Ruurdje will present Asian fibers for study, including touching.

DECEMBER: Presentation of challenge. 4 colors done anyway you want.

#### **New Business:**

1. Motion made to move start time to 10:30 am. Pros: Summer schedule at the library does not allow for social time prior to meeting. Social time happens anyway, so meetings don't actually start on time.

Cons: Later starts mean later endings.

Social time happens at snack break anyway; some spaces may rent by blocks of time.

MOTION TABLED. The next 4 meetings are already booked, so no change is necessary at this time. Kathy K will research the impact on meeting spaces.

2. Classes: Marsha announced that arrangements have been made with the library for another Cardboard Loom class, to be held Saturday, February 22 at 1 pm in the Striker building. The class is intended for about 15 students and will include making the looms. Marsha estimates 7 volunteers will be needed and will ask for them in January.

MOTION made to authorize expenditure from the treasury to purchase sufficient painter's tape and galvanized nails for the class. MOTION APPROVED.

3. History Camp: Marsha indicated that the presentation by Liz, Ingrid and herself was quite successful, the setting was appropriate and comfortable and she has suggested to the county that we would be willing to do it again.

4. Fall Fibre Fest is October 5 and 6 (Saturday and Sunday) in Montpelier, Virginia. Sandi urged everyone to enter the Skein, Garment and Fibre Arts competition. There are many categories; entrance fee is \$5.00, and there are prizes! Contact Sandi for more information. A complete schedule will be published in September at: https://fallfiberfestival.org.

#### **Old Business**

- 1. September, in order, starts on September 3 at 10:00 am at the Williamsburg Regional Library, when we set up our 6 week art show. Please contact Linda C. with information about any project you intend to display. Include any technical information about the project (plain weave on 4 shafts with clasped weft; cable knit wool yarn spun on wheel, etc.) and whether or not the object is for sale. If it is, your label may include the price if you like, but should include contact info so customers can arrange with you directly for purchase. The library staff will NOT administer sales and are not docents.
- 2. September 5 is the first Thursday our display will be up, and we are invited to demonstrate on that and every Thursday while our display is up. Please check with Kris to determine what dates you have signed up for.
- 3. September 7, Saturday, is the Go Green Expo at the Midtown Aquatics Center, 570 McLawhorne Drive, Newport News, VA. Bring a chair! Set up is from 9 to 9:30. We should demonstrate environmentally friendly aspects of spinning and weaving: plarn projects, cardboard looms, CD coasters, etc. Go as a visitor just for fun if you can't stay until 3:00 pm.

- 4. September 14 we have a booth at the Williamsburg Farmers Market. If it rains, our presentation is cancelled. Parking is available for free in the paid lot, but you must get a ticket in order to work the gate. Parking in the free lot is also usually available because we must be set up by 8:00 am. Bring whatever you are working on that is portable. Our booth is always a crowd favorite. We have signed up at least one observer as a member. Ask Your Secretary how she knows.....
- 5. September 16 is our monthly meeting. The meeting will be at the WJC Recreation Center on Longhill Road. Meeting begins at 10:00 a.m The building is open at 9:00 so feel free to come early to socialize if you wish. All meetings for the rest of the calendar year are scheduled at this location.

#### **Show and Tell**

Kathy brought 2 pine needle baskets. One she had shown previously with a "coral" base turned out to have some ocean waste material as a base, either plastic or petroleum, and it was falling apart. So she made another with a real piece of coral as a base.

Sandi modeled her tunic made from her long clasped-warp (yes, *clasped warp*) Saori fabric. The pattern was based on the rectangle width of the weaving and involved very little sewing. Sandi also had a long table runner done in rep weave with 2 colors and 2 textures put together. And finally she showed a baby blanket woven with 8/4 background and two colors of 8/2 stripes.

Ingrid piled up many skeins of wool she had died with KoolAid. The colors were bright, mostly primary, and thoroughly saturated. Ingrid reports that there is sufficient citric acid in KoolAid that it doesn't need any additional mordant. All of her skeins were wet finished. She reported that these

batches were a second effort, the first being her attempt to dye what she thought was rug wool, but which turned out to be synthetic. Nice to know that even the most experienced among us make mistakes. Finally, Ingrid reported that she will, at last, be getting the Norwegian spinning wheel she had ordered. When it appeared that it would never materialize, she purchased an antique wheel. Now she will be able to spin from the past all the way to the present.

Marsha showed off various combinations of plastic rings woven into earrings and pendants, including some woven using the Dorset Button methods we learned in June. Marsha will teach these techniques at Arts Alive at the West Point YMCA. Cost for the classes are \$15.00, plus \$10.00 materials. Marsha will teach Friday March 6, 2020. Janet brought her Saori woven shawl. We all got to stick our fingers in it. Yes, carry-around coziness.

Dee demonstrated her new, tiny, 3-D printed electric spinner with its cigar box case. It was merrily making fine yarn, powered by USB cord and battery or regular socketed electricity. She reported that initially the bobbins were too slippery, but she sanded them down and now take up is smooth and even.

Cindy displayed her needle case which folds into a heart shape, and closes with a teeny tiny dorset button that could hardly be seen, much less worked by hand!

Ann brought washcloths knitted by Iza, intended to be donated to a church.

Goodie showed off a purchased pine needle basket, and her own felted pins made with cookie cutters. Goodie also will be teaching at ArtsAlive - see the website mentioned above.

Finally, Liz modeled her knitted sun hat, made from a kit. Completely knitted, collapsible and lacy for ventilation.

#### **PROGRAM**

Liz demonstrated her methods for studying the yarn made from the wool of various breeds of sheep. Liz, as we know, is a re-enactor of the colonial period. Her subject and its presentation was done in modern clothes, but she could have dressed as George Washington or Thomas Jefferson, both noted for their detailed farm records. No Power Point slides for Liz: her studies are about training one's fingertips to recognize the benefits and shortcomings of various wools.

Meeting adjourned at 1:30 pm.
